For a long time, we were the only canoe club on this island offering a scholarship and now we offer three—each created to remember a giving person who went before their time should have been up—J.R. Rogers, Mike Haines, and Mary MacCheyne. Yesterday's mail carried word about two Bo Campos \$2000 scholarships being offered by Kai Opua Canoe Club. Both clubs are excelling in helping young people get a good start on the next stage of their lives.

A few weeks ago, a number of Keauhou adults and children joined Kai Opua and Kai Ehitu youth in the HI-PAL paddling event with the Hawaii Police department, a great example of the spirit of togetherness for good. Every day we see our more senior adults working with the younger generation to teach skills like huli recovery, paddle repair, skill development, steering, and coaching keiki and youth and there is nothing like a youngster wearing a medal for doing well. We see people grooming the grounds, rigging canoes, fixing the plumbing, inflating the tires, attaching number decals, rigging and unrigging the canoes, bailing out the canoes and fixing whatever has worn out or broken.

This is such a good time to be in this place called Keauhou—with new beginnings and new learnings as the ancestors did theirs. Enjoy your time at this time in this place.
